Blast Nazis In Romania

U.S. Bombers, Flying From Russian Bases, Pave Way for Assault

MOSCOW, June 7. (AP)—American heavy bombers waged an offensive against Nazi positions in Romania today and the Red Army ground troops continued to repulse strong German attacks inside that Balkan country.

In their first assault from new bases within the Soviet Union, the U.S. bombers, flying from the U.S.S.R., destroyed a key enemy air base at Galati, 150 miles southwest of Bucharest.

The raid, the first time that American and Russian crews worked together in launching an operation, was met by a surprise attack, the planes taking off and returning to the Soviet bases.

Airborne Troops Dropped by Both Sides as Germans Try to Pin Invaders to 50-mile Beachhead; Yanks Take Lead

SUPREME ADVANCE COMMAND POST, ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, June 7. (AP)—A great battle between airborne troops flared over Cherbourg Peninsula today as both the Allies and the Germans dropped fighting men from the skies over a wide area in the second day of the invasion of France.

Both sides advanced beachheads had been established over more than a 50-mile stretch of the peninsula.

Waves of Allied Paratroopers and Glider Troops poured down from a 50-mile long airfield strip, securing key positions and helping beat Nazi tank-led counterattacks, and the Nazis also dropped air troops.

For five months the Germans have been building an airborne army for just this purpose, led by Lt. Gen. Kurt Student who engineered the landing in Crete. RAF Mosquitoes last night destroyed five Junkers-52 troop carriers.

Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley is commander of U.S. ground forces participating in the attack.

The Germans said they had of new landing attempts near Caen, 100 miles northwest of Cherbourg, but later their reports indicated German coastal guns merely fired at Allied ships in the area, and there were no indications supreme headquarters was trying to invade there.

Allied invasion troops have been sailing in boats past many points, keeping the Germans in doubt where the next landing would come.

Steady Stream

In their steady-long steady stream, three waves of U. S. Sixth Air Force Gliders carried a steady stream of men, equipment and supplies to forces already fighting inland in Cherbourg Peninsula, supreme headquarters said.
