French Signal End of Truce For Evacuation of Wounded With Claim of Double Cross

HANOI, Indochina (UP)—France accused the Indochina Communists of a double-cross today and announced that French bombers would signal at midnight the end of the "mercy truce" for evacuation of wounded from Dien Bien Phu.

France charged the Reds with using the truce—which had been the one solid achievement of the Geneva conference—to rush troops and military supplies to the Red River delta for an attack on Hanoi. The Reds ignored the French ultimatum, which in effect told them to live up to their agreement by midnight "or else," and instead blamed France for collapse of the mercy evacuation of French Union wounded.

The Delta, itself, already is under heavy Communist pressure with attacks in battalion force carrying to outskirts within six miles of the capital.

Reds Evacuate Stronghold

In the latest action, an outnumbered unit of French and native troops were standing off an encircling ring of Reds at Anxa, a stronghold 50 miles southeast of Hanoi.

refusing to permit evacuation of wounded Viet Nam (loyal Indochinese) soldiers from Dien Bien Phu. Only 11 of the 1,300 wounded men in the fallen fortress were removed in the frustrating four days operations.

The Reds reduced the evacuation effort to a snail's pace by ignoring French demands that the fortress airstrip be repaired to permit French hospital planes to land. Only light aircraft capable of moving two to six men at a time, were able to land.

France's greatest concern today was with the threat to Hanoi from the Red forces swarming down the bomb-ravaged highway from Dien Bien Phu.

An outnumbered band of French and native troops stood off an encircling ring of Communist forces today at Anxa, a stronghold that may become the "Little Dien Bien Phu" of the Indochina war.

The French high command reported that tough troops defending the stronghold had repulsed eight Dien Bien Phu-type attacks in as many days. High command spokesmen said the French have been using 500-pound delayed action bombs in aid of the 100 French and native troops who have been holding fast against the enemy forces.
