MUNICH (UPI)—An Arab vengeance squad shot its way into the Israeli quarters of Olympic Village today, shot and killed an Israeli coach and were reported to have killed a second Israeli official. They took at least eight Israeli athletes hostage and threatened to execute them unless their demands were met.

Sunless Living Possible

DEL RIO, Tex. (UPI)—Dr. Michael Siffre, who endured long periods of depression and choking limestone dust, today was set to end seven months of isolation in a remote West Texas cave where he has studied man's reaction to living without the sun.

U.S. Funding of Baer Field Thruway Upheld in Appeals Court Decision

The 7th U.S. Circuit of Appeals in Chicago has upheld a decision in Federal Court here refusing to stop Federal funding of the \$3 million Baer Field Thruway.

Mrs. Siffre said her husband of one year was proud of the test results, but would often be depressed. "It was always the same for him, always," Nathalie Siffre said.

Siffre entered Midnight Cave Feb. 14 in a study of what he called man's "rhythm of life." He wanted to break free of man's traditional 24-hour cycle regulated by the rising and setting of the sun.

The U.S. Space Agency and the French Department of Defense are studying the experiments to determine how man adapts to long periods of activity.

Mrs. Siffre, fluent in four languages, also was anxious for her husband to emerge. "I am going to have the biggest party in my whole life," she said.

She assisted the all-French three-man ground team which kept a 24-hour watch on Siffre through a field phone and the electrodes which he wore constantly.

The experiment dictated a constant environment, and Siffre could only talk to the ground team, never knowing if his wife was in the experiment tent monitoring the conversation.
