Perjury 55-45; obstruction 50-50

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate today acquitted President Clinton of obstruction of justice and perjury, rejecting the House prosecutors' demand that the nation's 42nd president be re-moved from office for concealing an affair with a White House in

tern.

The vote on the impeachment article alleging obstruction was 50-50, far short of the two-frinds required for condiction. Earlier senators rejected the charge of perjury by a 55-45 vote, as 10 Republicans joined the Democrats even though Democrats have criticized the president for his conduct. Sen. Bob Graham, Democrat from Florida, had said. The president's self-inculgent actions were immoral, disgraceful, prevehensible History should and, I suspect, will – judgo that Wilham Jufferson Chutan dishonored henself and the highest office in our American democracy."

A two thirds majority was required for conviction.

Both charges would have required 67 votes for conviction.
