The outcome — or lack of one — left the nation wondering who would succeed Bill Clinton on Jan.

20 and raised the prospect the ques-tion would be unanswered for days. Florida's secretary of state said the recount should be finished by

the recount should be immed by the end of the day Thursday. Both national parties were sending teams of lawyers to monitor.

At last count, Bush led Gore by 1,655 votes in the unofficial Associated Press count with all Plorids precipits requiring but an Florida precincts reporting but an unknown number of absentee bal-lots yet to be counted.

The pressure on the recount was intense because Florida, with its 25 electoral votes, will decide the win-ner of the presidential election.

With only a single exception, it's what voters in Allen County did Tuesday as they resisted the temptation to rock the governmental boat. Their decision probably means the status will largely remain quo for the next few years as a new crop of officeholders who aren't that much different from their predecessors join a host of incumbents who won re-election.

Allen County offices, for example, will continue to be Democrat-free zones after Jan. 1 since not one of the Democrats seeking positions such as county treasurer, surveyor or coroner won their contests.

Final results showed 55.4
percent, or 117.221 of Allen
County's registered voters cast
ballots Tuesday, the lowest percentage in the past 44 years. The county sets its record high turnout for a presidential election – 88.6 percent – in 1960 when John F. Kennedy defeated Richard M. Nixon, and the pre-vious low – 72.9 percent – came in 1992 when Bill Clinton beat President Bush.
